THOUGHTS FROM THE AUDIENCE

Fitzmaurice Voicework® Workshop

On January 11th James Spencer held a workshop for the Village Players to share his extensive knowledge of the Fitzmaurice Voicework technique that uses a full body approach for voice production.

8 participants of varying ages, all with different "voice" backgrounds and reasons for being there, got together, armed with exercise mats, cushions and ready to spout forth the poetry that we'd been asked to learn.

After introducing ourselves & talking a little about the idea behind Catherine Fitzmaurice's Voicework, we warmed up by learning how to sway, shake and become aware of what our bodies were doing and learning to breathe effectively. James then taught the group several techniques and exercises intended to defy gravity and we got so good at these that, after a while, and a little coaxing, some of us were able to get our limbs trembling and hence find a tremor in our voices. This was called destructuring the voice, or trying to focus on the voice rather than the language spoken. The room was full of incoherent sounds, proving that we were on the right track!

A pairwork exercise involved observing one another's breathing patterns while we talked and recited our poetry. This showed us how using the whole body can influence voice output.

All in all, it was an interesting and useful experience and one that many performers could benefit from. Thank you James for giving us this insight into how to make one's whole body contribute to improved voicework.

Meet John Betjeman and Philip Larkin, two of England's leading poets of the 20th century John Betjeman and Philip Larkin were arguably two of the greatest English poets of the 20th century. Their bi-polarized quintessential Englishness ranges from Betjeman's 'The scent of the conifers, the sound of the bath ...' to Larkin's 'Their nippers have got bare feet, their unspeakable wives ...'. But what is intriguing about these two poets is the way their works complement each other (as the poets compliment each other in our production). They are related to one another in such a way that if - hold tight for a minute whilst we bring some maths into the Conversation and combine the beauty of mathematics with the beauty of poetry and then either multiply the reciprocal of Betjeman with Larkin, or the reciprocal of Larkin with Betjeman - their product is ONE. Come and watch some alchemy in action at the CPO in May as the VPs present Messrs Betjeman and Larkin in Conversations.

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
