The play traces the poetic careers of John Betjeman and Philip Larkin, how they saw each other's works and what inspired them to write and to publish. The play is amusing, sometimes a little naughty and quite revealing. It contains poetic passages from both its subjects. The roles are:

John Betjeman's inner spirit (F)
Philip Larkin's inner spirit (F)
Two voices to recite the works of the two poets (can be M or F)
There you have six roles in all.
The two reciters are not expected learn lines as their parts are to be read -- not memorised.

There are no particular costumes or properties and no set. However, the use of spotlights and sound amplification is very important.

Two boys,


A girl then a boy,
